OVERVIEW

Why toppers' advice matters

Every year, over 2.5 lakh candidates appear for CAT and only about 30 land between the 99.98 and 100 percentile. Scoring that high takes hard work and smart work: long hours alone are not enough without a strategy that pays off in every phase of preparation. A plan should also fit your own capacity, since some learn quickly, some need more time on concepts, and not everyone has the same time to prepare.

Most toppers of the past five years **studied by themselves with guidance from mentors and lots of mock tests**. Ask them and they will say in unison: **practice as many mock tests as you can**.

KEY TAKEAWAYS

Six things toppers agree on

1

Mocks are the backbone

Toppers took anywhere from 35 to 110+ mocks and treated them as the core of preparation.

2

Analysis beats attempts

Keep an error log and fix repeated mistakes. Analysing a mock matters more than taking it.

3

Learn concepts before mocks

Finish the syllabus first, then ramp up mocks (Madhur Gupta, Riddhi Dugar).

4

Pick questions smartly

Start with easy sets and questions; leave the hard ones for the end.

5

Fix your weakest section

Give extra time to your weak area (Anmol, Kshitiz, Akshay) but keep strengths sharp.

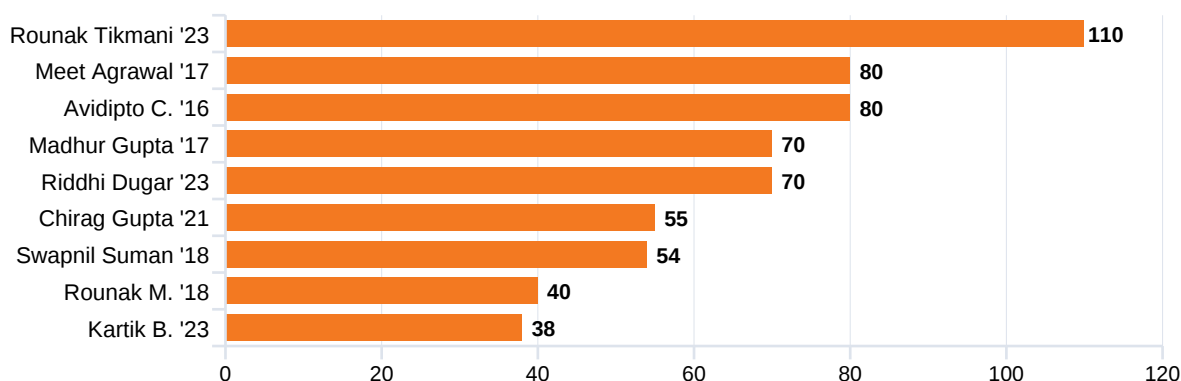
6

Stay calm on D-Day

Variety in mocks removes surprises, so you can keep your cool in the exam.

BY THE NUMBERS

How many mocks did toppers take?

Recent toppers (2024 and 2025) on mocks

Topper	How they used mocks	Interview
Anmol Gupta CAT 2025 99.96 percentile	Prep was mainly mocks and analysis. Analysed every mock, aiming to solve 3 RCs and all 8 VA questions.	Full interview >
Pranshav Shah CAT 2025 99.80 percentile	Primary focus on as many mocks as possible, plus analysis. Daily timed practice: 4 RCs, 4 DILR sets, 30-40 Quant questions.	Full interview >
Vagish Nangia CAT 2024 100 percentile	Short on time, so practised each section, then sectional and full-length mocks.	Full interview >
Sarthak Jaiswal CAT 2024 99.97 percentile	Mocks are very important for QA and VARC; for DILR, plain practice matters more than mocks.	Full interview >

SECTION-WISE PLAYBOOK

Distilled from the toppers' advice

VARC

- Read regularly: newspapers, editorials (The Hindu, Mint), fiction or topics you enjoy.
- Pick the easiest 2 of 4 RCs and aim to finish each in 7-8 minutes.
- Practise para jumbles, odd-one-out and summary questions; learn paragraph structure.

DILR

- Spend about 5 minutes to judge if a set is solvable; don't sink time into a stuck set.
- Read all sets early; start with DI and easier LR sets to clear sectional cutoffs.
- Treat sets like puzzles. Variety of practice makes patterns feel repetitive.

Quant

- Get basics and the logic behind formulas right first.
- Attempt easy questions first, then return to harder ones.
- Solve without relying on a calculator; speed comes from experience.

Anmol Gupta

Mocks and analysis first, VARC being the weakest section

99.96 %ile

My preparation was mainly focused on mocks and analysis. For VARC, I read a lot of articles as this has always been my weakest section. I analysed every mock, aiming for 3 RCs and all 8 VA questions.

For DILR, my aim was to solve all 5 sets. I invested a maximum of 5 minutes to judge whether a set was solvable. In the actual exam I attempted all 5 sets in under 35 minutes.

Vagish Nangia

100 %ile

Started July 2024 despite a packed 7th semester

I started considering CAT seriously in July 2024. I focused on understanding the exam, practising questions for each section, and doing sectional and full-length mocks.

In VARC the key is to read and attempt an entire comprehension within 7-8 minutes. For Verbal Ability, understanding paragraph structure is crucial for odd-one-outs and sentence placement.

35-40 mocks; analysis was pivotal

In DILR persistence is key, but spending one more minute on a set can cost time you need elsewhere. Mocks teach you how to allot time to each set.

In Quant, attempt the easier questions first and leave the difficult ones. I attempted 35-40 mocks; analysing them played a pivotal role in refining my strategy.

Smart section-wise starting order

In VARC, identify the 2 of 4 RCs that are easiest (about 24 min), then focus on VA. In DILR, start with the DI set and then pick 2 of the remaining 3 puzzles. In QA, filter questions by strength and attempt them first.

I read newspapers daily, preferring topics like sports and politics, and solved a variety of DILR puzzles with extra focus on LR.

Chirag Gupta

Started March 2021; 50-60 mocks

For VARC, I read fiction mainly and even that helped a lot. For DILR, I focused on identifying set types and read every set in the first five minutes, starting with the easiest DI sets, then the easier LR sets. This ensures you clear sectional cutoffs.

In Quant I got my basics right first and did easy questions before harder ones. I took about 50-60 mocks. On exam day: stay calm and don't think too much about the result.

Kshitiz Singhal

Syllabus first, then mocks; no coaching

I started by learning the CAT exam pattern and syllabus. Once the syllabus was complete, I began mocks. I did not enroll in coaching but bought study material and mock series from noted institutes.

VARC was my weak area. Seniors told me to work on fundamentals, so I reworked my approach and analysed mocks in detail. My scores started improving.

Rishi Mittal**A non-reader who cracked VARC**

100 %ile

People think you must read a lot to score in VARC. Even a non-reader can score; I haven't read a single novel. I was inconsistent at first, scoring anywhere from 18 to 62 out of 102, then worked on RC separately with a strategy for each question type.

For DILR I solved TIME and IMS material. The more mocks you give, the more sets you solve, and the easier DILR gets. Quant is experience based too.

Swapnil Suman**Second attempt; 54 mocks**

I started in August and took mocks of popular institutes: 3-4 on weekday evenings and 1-2 on Sundays, 54 in total. Analysing each mock and learning from each mistake was the game changer.

I treated DILR as puzzle solving. If one practises enough problems, most questions start to seem repetitive and easy to tackle.

I worked five days a week and found almost no time. I cut relaxing time at night and woke earlier for an extra hour of study. Weekends were solely for CAT.

From the beginning I gave a mock at least every other weekend and analysed it for improvement.

CAT is a random exam. Mocks familiarise you with easy, moderate, difficult, lengthy and vague scenarios. With enough of them, nothing will surprise you and you keep your cool.
